

Christmas, Saints, And Regular People

Famed Hollywood director Martin Scorsese has produced a docuseries for Fox Nation that explores the lives and sacrifices of several historical figures. The eight-segment series, titled "The Saints," will be presented in two parts that straddle the holy seasons of Christmas and Easter.

Scorsese profiles a handful of Christians that the Roman Catholic Church (RCC) considers to be "saints." He chose John the Baptist, Joan of Arc, Sebastian, Thomas Beckett and others. John the Baptist, of course, is the only biblical figure that Scorsese includes in the series.

So the series, which began November 17, raises an obvious question. What is a saint? And why does it matter that we answer that question?

Believe it or not, it matters a lot. And Christmas is the perfect time to remember the significance of what the Bible means when it refers to Christians as "saints."

Roman Catholics and "Saints"

Martin Scorsese was raised in the Roman Catholic Church. He has stated that he "grew up practically living in St. Patrick's Old Cathedral" in New York. As a child, he

says, he was fascinated by the statues of the saints and martyrs which filled the echoing cathedral. Who were these people, and what were their lives like?

In Roman Catholic theology, five years after a Christian dies and goes to heaven, he or she can be considered for sainthood.

Canonization is a process that, Catholics teach, recognizes a person's "sainthood." God alone bestows sainthood, but the Church can recognize God's action and then install that person into the canon of saints.

To repeat, these "saints" must be in heaven. That's so that they can intercede for the Christians on earth. That's part of the duty of sainthood. (Protestants often think that Catholics pray to the saints. More accurately, they pray *through* the saints. Saints in heaven serve as intermediaries between Christians on earth and God).

Along with being in heaven, the RCC applies rigorous criteria to determine sainthood, ending in one simple conclusion. "Saints" are Christians who have been granted special favor from God, lived lives that demonstrated that special favor, and they can now exercise that favor by mediating for Christians in the RCC.

Canonized "saints" share the chief attribute of martyrdom. Each of the people that Scorsese profiles died as martyrs in the service of the Christian faith. Guiltless but accused of crimes they did not commit, they sacrificed their lives for God. The circumstances may have been quite different, but the single thread tying them together is their self-sacrifice.

The admiration of the Martyrs

Everyone, religious or not, associates saints with people of extraordinary virtue. There is no problem with that. In fact, we admire heroes who sacrifice themselves for God and others because that self-sacrifice reminds us of the greatest sacrifice of all, Christ's death on the cross.

But there is a problem with attributing a kind of superspirituality to a Christian martyr. Admiration for a person's sacrifice or their extraordinary life fosters similar virtues in us. But veneration or adoration crosses the line into worship.

And exalting certain people to the level of adoration or mediation raises two other problems. First, it's a hierarchal view of Christians and implies that only certain, superspiritual people can be used of God in great ways. And second, only those super-Christians will sacrifice themselves for Christ.

But God calls all Christians to the same sainthood—to serve and sacrifice our lives for Christ, to be part of the great work of God.

God is an equal-opporuntiy Savior. Every Christian is saved the same way, enjoys the same salvation in Christ, and is called to give up his life to serve the cause of Christ.

What Does the Bible Say?

In the Bible, the word "saint" is never applied to super-Christians. Instead, it is applied to all Christians all the time. It echoes the expectation that Christians would live for Christ, and that every Christian is set apart for His service.

The biblical word "saint" comes from a Greek word that means "consecrated to God, holy, sacred, pious." In the New Testament, it's used in the plural ("saints") 67 times,



and only once in the singular (Phil. 4:21). So it normally references the collective community of faith (Acts 9:32, 19:13, 26:10; Eph. 4:12). Just regular people who serve an extraordinary Savior.

And three times the word refers to the character of Christians (Rom. 16:2, Eph. 4:12, 5:3). Followers of Christ are expected to show their relationship with Christ through their behavior as saints of God.

So, biblically, a key distinctive in the Bible is that "saints" are Christians who make up the body of Christ on earth. The process is not canonization. It's sanctification, being made holy by the work of the Holy Spirit in the Christian's life.

Why does this matter at Christmas?

Christ did not come into the world as a Super-Human being. He came as one of us. He died on the cross as a man, flesh and blood, so that we could live with Him. Christ didn't come to make super-saints, but to save people who are dead in their trespasses and sins (Eph. 2:1).

The Bible teaches that Christ alone is our Mediator with the Father, and that all Christians stand on equal ground in our salvation and our relationship with God (1 Tim. 2:5). Regular Christians can confidently approach the Father in the name of Christ and can know that their prayers are heard and answered. Not because of super-saints mediating the conversation, but because of Jesus Christ.

See, Jesus came at Christmas for all of us. He did not come to make super-spiritual people who God favors above all others. No, He came for everyone one of us, from the worst sinner to the classless reprobate to the religious poser and the prideful imposter.

And He calls us all to be sanctified followers of Christ.

The problem with venerating saints is not only the inherent proximity to idolatry, but it's also the implication that you and I can't be just as holy, just as admired, or just as capable of living for Christ as any other Christian through the ages.

You don't have to be a super-saint to please God. You just need to surrender to and faithfully follow the One True Savior who came at Christmas to die for your sins.

The Need for Male Role Models

According to NC Census data, 52.6% of children in North Carolina are currently growing up in a single parent home. More specifically, 28.8% of NC family households have only a female parent, with no tional spouse present. During First st Shallotte's annual Worldview Conference this year, Alex McFarland listed several key factors that contribute to men tal health issues in young children and teens. Alex McFarland stated that the number one contributor to mental health issues such as homosexuality and transgenderism, as well as depression and anxiety, is the lack of bonding with the parent of the same gender. Who would have thought that girls need their moms, and boys need their dad to model healthy and biblical behavior respectively? God did when he designed marriage to be between a man and a woman, each with their distinct roles, for life (Matt 19:4-6, cf. Gen 2:24). Both mom and dad are essential role models in a young child's life.

But let's zoom in on men and sons. North Carolina is not alone in this epidemic that is the lack of father figures and male leadership in the home. across the nation are growing up in fatherless homes, or at times, homes with a negative male influence. While the reasons behind an alarming divorce rate and a saddeningly high rate of men abandoning their families are many and complex, it all boils down to sin and brokenness. This sin and brokenness often becomes cyclical, as is the tendency with most sin (Judg 2:16-19). Broken families create broken children, who carry baggage others do not see or understand. These boys grow to be men, and these men carry this baggage into their families. And when things get tough, they often default to what was modeled to them. It is a grim and downward spiral - an ever-growing one.
